

• Soroptimist 101, presented

by Carolyn Roberts, was very informative. She explained that we belong to Soroptimist International as one of the five federations. SI does not dictate how federations run, but we have similar missions. We are stronger and more credible as we work together to advocate for women around the world. Carolyn recommended checking out the Soroptimist website for podcasts, webinars, branding, and more.

- Jenny Erickson discussed that SIA clubs have access to a Microsoft 365 account. Through these various tools, clubs and members can share forms and resources. We definitely could use some additional training on how to utilize these tools. She recommended Soroptimist.org for member resources.
- Alice Helle asked us to support the Region fundraiser by buying Soroptimist apparel on <u>https://</u> <u>shirtsfromfargo.com/shop-storefronts/nonprofits/</u> <u>soroptimist/soroptimist-peaks-to-plains-region/</u> She requested we provide gift donations for the Creative Corner at Region Spring Conference in Fort Collins, CO on May 2-3, 2025.
- Several women gave ideas for increasing the number of girls/women we serve in our Dream Programs.
 Some ideas were to partner with businesses and schools to sponsor LYD scholarships or DIBI sessions.
 By providing incentives for those involved and making programs accessible, it can increase impact. Big Goal Accelerator Projects are another way to increase the reach to more girls and women. Sharing success sto-

ries is very important and communication is key. It's necessary to get permission from participants, use empowering language, and speak about them with dignity. Uplift HER was reviewed by Harriet Beck as one more way to communicate how Soroptimists are addressing specific obstacles that women and girls face. Clubs can educate through social media using this hashtag- #Soroptimistuplifther.

- Philanthropy was discussed by Andrea Hartman and others. Several ideas were given regarding enhancing donor engagement to increase fundraising success, boost club visibility, and strengthen relationships.
 Always share what the money is going toward when fundraising to show our impact within the community.
 Make sure to recognize donors (at events and on social media) and keep in communication with them.
- Engaging members, increasing membership, and member retention was spoken about by Bonnie Newton & Linda Shaw. Some ideas were to have member outreach regarding the benefits and personal development opportunities. They recommend having an onboarding process for new members and mentors for them. She encouraged members to develop an elevator speech that is brief and sparks interest. Draft your 'Soroptimist why' by starting with an attention grabber, explain your personal journey, highlight impact locally and broader, add a call to action.
- By-laws and amendments were reviewed. They have concerns about Amendment 7 and 8. Clubs need to vote by December.

Soroptimist International of the Americas, Inc. Big Goal Accelerator Projects

Big Goal Accelerator Projects (BGAP) are club work that increases access to education for women and girls *facing obstacles* and leads to economic empowerment. This work is outside of our Dream Programs and will count toward the 2021-2031 Big Goal of investing in the dreams of half a million women and girls. These projects are Soroptimist-led, hands-on, and are reported to SIA through the official reporting link <u>https://form.jotform.com/210685659585067</u>.

We have two upcoming Big Goal Accelerator opportunities that **we would love to have members help with, according to your interests and skills.** We're also in need of a committee chair. These classes will start at the first part of the year and will be held monthly. The sessions will vary according to needs, but will have some similarities with the topics in Dream It Be It. However, they will be adult focused for the various populations that we will be serving.

The Women's Homeless Shelter will be one of the sites where our Soroptimist club plans to hold small sessions for women that are interested as well as referred by case managers. They have requested some life skills training, goal setting, and sessions with steps that lead toward attaining education and/or employment (emailing, interest surveys, dream boards, goal setting, resume creation, interviewing skills). Pat Murdock is employed there and can answer questions that you may have. Donna Visco led our first successful class on Nov. 9th.

The other site that requested Soroptimist assistance is *Horizonte Adult Education* serving English language Learners and Adult High School students. These classes will start out with dream boards and goal setting, then work on education transition and job attainment skills. Additionally, there will be a family literacy focus for mothers and grandmothers that centers on supporting their children's/grandchildren's education at home and in the school setting. Horizonte has a check out library with bi-lingual children's books that will be incorporated. Carma Ingram and Kathy Margaritis would appreciate ideas and can answer questions about these upcoming classes.

More details and dates will be coming soon on these opportunities for service. Please think about where you might be interested in helping out with these groups. We will need all hands-on deck to accomplish these additional projects. Our members have many professional and personal skills that can benefit these communities. Think about friends and acquaintances that may want to join us in our efforts... we are always looking to add members to our club in the great work of Soroptimist International of Salt Lake City.

Dream It Be It at Granite Connection - By Kathy Margaritis

Dream It Be It (DIBI) got off to a great start on Friday, October 18th at Granite Connection High School. There were 21 young ladies that were quite engaged in creating their 'Dream Boards' focusing on their short-term and long-term goals. Using motivational stickers, washi tape, and markers they got quite creative! Some of the future professions they were working towards were quite lofty such as a pediatric surgeon, anesthesiologist, social worker, ultra-sound tech., paralegal, cosmetology and others. Many had the short-term goal of graduation (some as soon as December) and getting a job.

The next part of the class focused on talking about S.M.A.R.T. (Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Relevant, Time-bound) goals and having the girls fill out some goal prompts. From those they set a goal and some action steps toward that goal. The class finished off with the girls writing a letter to themselves about their ambitions, what they are proud of today, plus words of encouragement for the future. Carma sends these letters out the following year to help them stay on track and appreciate how far they've come during that year. The girls also enjoyed a small breakfast and several cute incentives including pens, bracelets and bookmarks with motivational sayings, along with lotion and nail files.

We appreciate the Soroptimist members who came and helped set up and encouraged the girls to participate in all parts of the session. Leading the discussion was Donna Visco, Carma, and Kathy M., supporting helpers were Rita, Donna S., Janis, and Julia. There will be two more sessions on January 17th and March 7th (8:30 am) with the Granite Connection students.

Another possible group that will be served with DIBI is a middle school. This is a developing opportunity that we would love to have member participation with, especially if you are familiar with this younger age group. Details will be forth-coming as we may have some scheduling flexibility here. Please let us know if specific times or days work better for you to participate.
