DIBI provides guidance, training, and resources to prepare girls for life and career success. Our classes scheduled in January:

- Roosevelt Continuation School: Thursday, January 16th, for our first session, 8th grade girls will create dream boards and set goals toward achieving them. Two sessions with different groups. Arrive for set up at 8:45 (class from 9:15 - 10:45); second session from 11:15 - 12:45. The school is located at 3225 So. 800 E., Millcreek (enter on 800 E from 3300 S).
- Granite Connection High: January 17th, will be the second DIBI session, arrive at 8:00 a.m. (class 8:30-10:30a.m.). It will focus on having resilience through challenges and the girls will determine what their values are and how they affects life and career choices. Address: 501 E 3900 So., Media Center.

In Loving Memory of Georgia Presnell By-Carolyn Roberts

I met Georgia in January 2022. After spending most of her life in Sacramento California near her oldest son, Burt, she sold her house and moved to Orem Utah where her second son Greg lived. She had been a member of the SI Sacramento club for 40+ years. She enlisted a friend to help her find a club in Utah. I was contacted because I was the current Salt Lake City club president. Jan Crane was the membership chair. Jan and I drove to Orem to meet Georgia at the Treeo Independent Living Center. Georgia was 103 years old at the time.

We welcomed Georgia into our club and invited her to attend our meetings. Club members drove to Orem to celebrate her birthday on June 7 each year for three years. Georgia was full of vim and vigor and continued to be passionate about Soroptimist. Georgia started attending our meetings and events. In February she came to the service activity to assemble cleaning kits for People Helping People. In May she attended our 2022 Live Your Dream Awards luncheon. She came to our June Garden Party fundraiser and our annual Christmas Party. By February 2023 Geor-

gia had a gentleman friend. He lived at Treeo and was very attentive, escorting her to wherever she needed to go. Her "Friend" drove her to our 2023 Live Your Dream Awards Luncheon in a BMW sports car. When asked about him, she would always say he was a perfect gentleman and very intelligent. Although he was at least ten years younger than she was, he passed away within the next year.

I visited her as often as I could and occasionally took her on outings. She always asked how the "girls" were, referring to our Soroptimist members. She had a sharp memory and would ask about members by name. She read and re-read our club newsletters.

She was always looking forward to her next birthday. As soon as one birthday was over, she would enthusiastically tell you how old she would be on the next birthday. I never once heard her say anything about "when I'm gone," or "I won't be around for that." She talked as though she would live forever. And she almost did. During the time I knew her she always dyed her own hair blonde, she had her nails done and wore full makeup including false eyelashes. She wore heels until the last year of her life, at which time, she conceded to dressy flats. In addition to the beautiful rings and necklaces she always wore, she also wore an ankle chain. It's the little things. She was mobile enough to dance on her 105th birthday.

Georgia passed away December 14 after surviving a heart attack two weeks earlier. The doctors couldn't believe she rallied. But I believe it. Georgia taught me to look at growing older differently. I'm not scared of it anymore.

Statue of first woman state senator, elected in Utah, unveiled at U.S. Capitol By Emily Anderson Stern



More than one-and-a-quarter centuries after Martha Hughes Cannon became the first woman to be elected to a state senate, a statue of the Utahn — flanked by the state's highest-ranking woman elected officials — was unveiled at the U.S. Capitol on Wednesday.

Lt. Gov. Deidre Henderson, who previously was state senator, too, recalled during the ceremony, "Several years ago, a mother brought her young daughter to visit the Utah State Capitol building. She showed her a framed por-

trait of all the senators hanging on the wall outside the Senate chamber. After studying the picture for a few moments, the exasperated daughter said, 'No fair. Where are the girls?' "To that little girl, I say, we're right here, and so are you," Henderson continued.

With Johnny Cash representing Arkansas on her right-hand, Cannon is now the fourteenth woman selected to be portrayed in National Statuary Hall. The other figure representing Utah is Brigham Young — the state's first governor while it was still a territory and the second president of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. The <u>Utah Legislature voted nearly seven years ago</u> to replace a statue of Philo Farnsworth, a Utah inventor who is often credited with developing the electronic TV, with one of Cannon amid <u>conversations about how to improve women's standing</u> in the state. Utah has <u>ranked last in the nation for women's equality</u> multiple times over the last several years.

Last month, <u>Utahns elected a record-breaking number of women</u> to the Utah Legislature, but over a hundred years after Cannon beat her husband for a seat in the Senate, men will still have a supermajority. "I didn't do a lot to get her here, but she did a lot to get me here," U.S. Rep. Celeste Maloy, the only woman currently representing Utah in Congress, told a crowd gathered for Cannon's unveiling.

Then Maloy urged onlookers — which included the president of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saint's Relief Society, one of the oldest and largest women's organizations in the world — to not view Cannon, who was also a doctor and traveled across oceans fleeing religious persecution multiple times, as one-

dimensional. "Let her be her and respect all of the things she represents, because there's something in there that speaks to everybody here," Maloy said.
